Wednesday 11 September 7.30pm The Taste of Things (La Passion de Dodin Bouffant) (12A)

France, Belgium 2023 | 2hrs 15m Dir: Anh Hung Tran | Cast: Juliette Binoche, Benoît Magimel | Language: French (subtitled)

Sun-kissed rural France, the 1880s: château-owning gourmet Dodin strives for culinary perfection. Gracing his kitchen for twenty years labours his highly esteemed cook and part-time lover Eugénie (Juliette Binoche), who produces with demure expertise the lavish dishes he formulates. Appreciative, wellto-do friends are indulged, while the pair's enduring relationship gently simmers. A gastronomic voyeur's feast and carnivores' delight... (though a vegan's bad dream).

Syria, UK, France, 2022 | 1hr 43mins Dir: Soudade Kaadan | Cast: Hala Zein, Kinda Alloush, Samer al Masri Language: Arabic (subtitled)

Even as Damascus is besieged. husband and father Mutaz adamantly refuses to leave the family home for an uncertain future, impervious to the blown walls, an evacuated suburb and the fears of his wife Hala for their safety, especially that of young daughter Zeina. This surprisingly gentle film, with unexpected glimpses of magical realism, suggests that living under fire can include factors other than mortal danger, including patriarchal quandaries, teenage hopes and dreams, shifting gender dynamics; all amidst a precarious family life.

Japan, Spain 2023 | 1hr 46mins Dir:Ryûsuke Hamaguchi | Cast: Hitoshi Omika, Ryô Nishikawa | Language: Japanese (subtitled)

In the woodland hamlet of Harasawa where life is beautifully simple and the pure spring waters sustain the surrounding inhabitants, taciturn widowed father Takumi lives with his young daughter. Two strangers arrive from Tokyo to deliver their company's proposal to create a 'glamping' resort, a project which will directly impact the villagers' way of life. At a heated gathering, city interests and locals' concerns clash and polarize. Can a compromise be found – and with what result? Expect the unexpected.

A dedicated new teacher comes up against a modern school's systems when pupils are suspected of an escalating series of thefts from the teachers' staff room. Professional ostracizing and lack of privacy are two of several contentious issues to surface as the investigation widens amidst defensive parents, sparring pupils and inter-staff allegiances. A superbly-crafted, compelling film. Oscar nominated 2024.

Mongolia, France,etc. 2023 | 1hr 39m Dir: Zoljargal Purevdash | Cast: Battsooj Uurtsaikh, Batzorig Sukhbaatar Language: Mongolian (subtitled)

Young physics genius Ulzii could win a scholarship through a national competition. While their mother seeks work in the countryside, he and his younger siblings face a harsh winter alone in their rudimentary yurt edging the Mongolian capital. Torn between his family and the competition, Ulzii risks losing the chance that could eventually lead him out of poverty. Like him, Mongolia is a country striving to find its place in a changing world.

Denmark 2022 | Ihr 46mins Dir: Niels Arden Oplev | Cast: Sofie Gråbøl, Lene Maria Christensen Language: Danish (subtitled)

Accompanied by her sister, Inger (superbly portrayed by Sofie Gråbøl of *The* Killing) embarks on a muchanticipated coach trip to Paris, where she had once fallen in love. When she discloses having a psychiatric condition to fellow travellers, Inger faces both sympathy and prejudice. Inviting us to look beyond a misunderstood disorder and its associated characteristics, this sensitively delivered narrative follows their adventure, with its highs, lows, laugh-outloud moments and touching connections.


